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3M PFAS Settlement Work Group Meetings

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Background

- Co-Trustees will provide and annual update to the work groups and public on implementing the Conceptual Plan
- The Conceptual Plan (10.4) states:
 - "The Co-Trustees will at a minimum conduct an annual review of the [Conceptual] Plan implementation efforts and obtain feedback from the work groups. This review will include consideration of new information that has evolved over the previous year, a review of actual costs of projects, reallocation discussions as needed, and discussion of any other adjustments that may be necessary to ensure the effectiveness of the plan."
 - "...Co-trustees will continue to use the Minnesota 3M PFAS website (https://3msettlement.state.mn.us/) to update the public on project implementation."

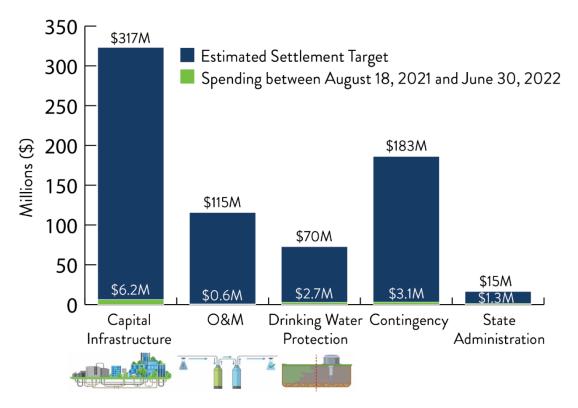
Process

- Annual Review includes:
 - Section 1. Annual Review Purpose
 - Section 2. Progress on the Implementation of the Conceptual Plan
 - Section 3. Impacts to Implementation from New Information
 - Section 4. Projects in Fiscal Year 2023
 - Section 5. Contingency Funding and Fund Reallocation
- Annual Review focuses on implementation of the Conceptual Plan from its release through the end of Fiscal Year (FY) 2022: August 18, 2021 – June 30, 2022
 - The document is intended to be produced on a fiscal year basis: FY 2023, FY 2024, etc.
- The document is for work group members and the public

Section 2 – Implementation Progress

Section 2.1 & 2.2 – Implementation

- Approximately \$13.9 million spent in Settlement funding across the five funding allocations
- 20 grant agreements executed
- Projects include:
 - Land purchases and planning and design work for water treatment plants
 - Connecting homes in various neighborhoods to municipal water
 - Installing POETSs for private wells

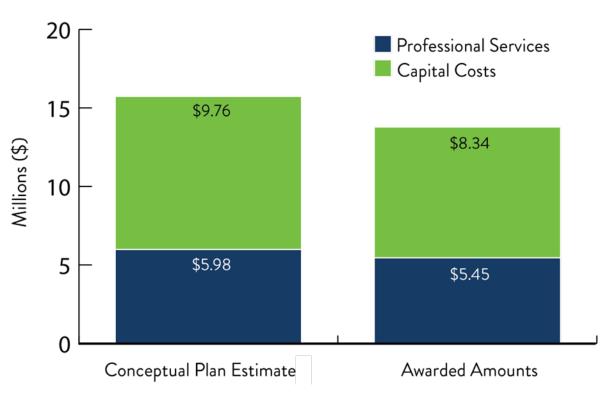


Funding Spent Across Funding Allocations, August 2021–June 2022

Section 2 – Implementation Progress

Section 2.3 – Comparison of Estimated Costs to Awarded Funding

- Capital grant funding awarded was slightly lower than Conceptual Plan estimates
 - Professional services awarded amount was \$0.53 million less than estimated
 - Capital services awarded amount was \$1.42 million less than estimated



Cost Comparison of Conceptual Plan Estimates and Grant Awards for Cottage Grove and Woodbury (combined) Municipal System Infrastructure, August 2021–June 2022

- New information has resulted in additional implementation costs
 - Changing PFAS health values for drinking water
 - Inflation and other cost increases
 - Accounting for temporary drinking water treatment systems on-going O&M

Discussed on next three slides

 Conceptual Plan built with a degree of resiliency (e.g., conservative assumptions), but may need to use contingency funds or the fund reallocation process to cover additional implementation costs in the future

Section 3.1 – Changing PFAS Health Values for Drinking Water

- January & March 2022: MDH released health-based values (HBV) for PFHxA of 0.2 (parts per billion [ppb]) and PFBS of 0.1 ppb (was 2 ppb), respectively
 - 20 private wells and 0 public wells received a health advisory
 - All 20 wells were previously identified to receive treatment in the Conceptual Plan
- EPA plans to release draft MCLs for PFOA and PFOS in 2023, with final MCLs January 2024
 - MDH also reviewing new information on health effects of PFOA and PFOS, and is in the process of updating their HBVs
- Design costs for providing PFAS treatment to existing municipal wells, not currently included in the Conceptual Plan to receive treatment, are Settlement-eligible for Cottage Grove and Woodbury

Section 3.2 – Inflation and Other Cost Increases

- Conceptual Plan assumed 3% annual inflation based on past trends and professional judgement; current inflation is higher at about 7%
 - Higher inflation, labor shortages, and supply chain issues have made cost harder to predict and are driving price increases
 - For example, material and equipment costs have increased by approximately 35% for water treatment and ductile iron, and over 100% for plastics and rubber from 2020 to 2022

Section 3.3 – Accounting for Temporary Drinking Water Treatment Systems

- Temporary municipal treatment systems currently operating in the East Metro
 - 3M provided up to \$40 million to fund temporary drinking water treatment systems (in addition to the Settlement funding) for up to 5 years or until the long-term plan is put in place
 - Once this provision expires on February 20, 2023, Settlement funds will cover the O&M costs of these temporary systems until the long-term water systems are in place
 - Co-Trustees are gathering data on how much funding is needed to cover these costs

Section 4 – Fiscal Year 2023 Projects

- Co-Trustees sent a voluntary Annual Review questionnaire in November 2022
 - Purpose was to accurately report on community plans to use Settlement funds to start, continue, or finish projects in FY 2023, and to monitor progress of Settlement implementation
 - Co-Trustees plan to conduct questionnaire annually in conjunction with Annual Review

Section 4 – Fiscal Year 2023 Projects

Anticipated major projects in FY 2023

- ✓ Continue planning and construction of new and expanded water treatment plants in Cottage Grove, Oakdale, and Woodbury
- ✓ Begin planning and construction of improvements to the St. Paul Park water distribution system to connect 3rd well
- ✓ Begin planning for water system interconnections between the Newport and Woodbury and Cottage Grove

- ✓ Connecting homes to municipal drinking water supply systems in various neighborhoods and communities
- ✓ Continue the connection of homes with private wells to municipal water supplies
- ✓ Continue sampling private wells and installing whole-home water filter systems or POETSs
- ✓ Continue to fund the Project 1007 feasibility study under the drinking water protection allocation

Section 5 – Contingency Funding & Fund Reallocation

- Conceptual Plan is flexible and resilient to help address uncertainties into the future
 - Contingency fund reserves funding to address different areas of future uncertainty, and does not require fund reallocation (Section 10.3 in Conceptual Plan)
 - Fund reallocation is process of evaluating progress on project implementation, compare actual costs to plan estimates, and monitor where and when funds may warrant reallocation (Section 10.4 in Conceptual Plan)
 - The Conceptual Plan provides a framework to reallocate funding that includes incorporating work group and public feedback, should it be necessary

Section 5 – Contingency Funding & Fund Reallocation

Using the 2021-2022 Annual Review process, the Co-Trustees have determined that a fund reallocation is not necessary right now because:

- Implementation costs are overall within the estimates in the Conceptual Plan
- EPA MCLs and MDH HBVs for PFOA and PFOS have not yet been released
- Co-Trustees will have a better sense of construction and other project implementation costs, including future cost increases for materials and labor, as communities continue implementation
- Co-Trustees will continue to consider project costs and new information, and how it may affect the need for reallocation in the 2022-2023 Annual Review
