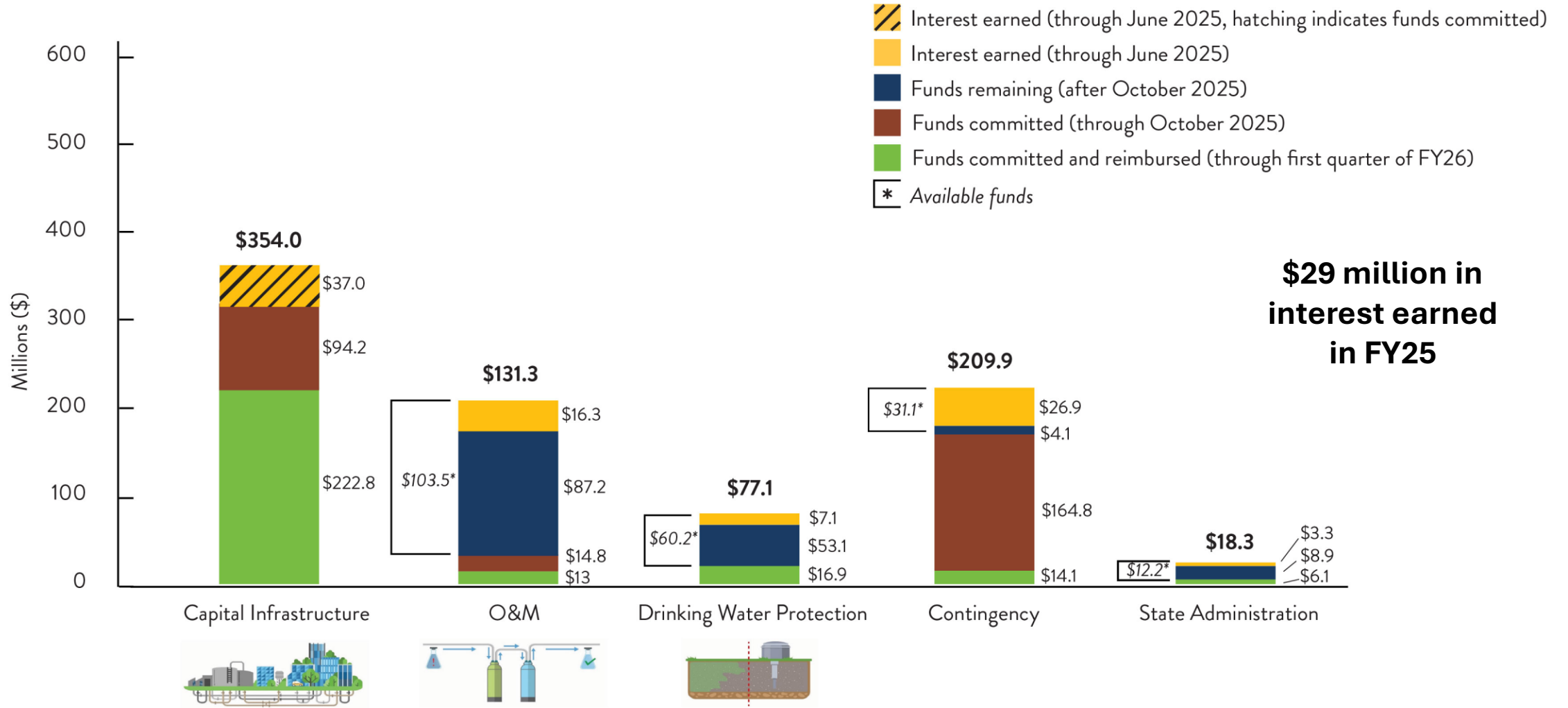

New awards in progress

Community survey

- MPCA reached out to communities during the summer of 2025
- Questions were tailored for each community
- Collected information on project's estimated grant request date, completion date or length of grant, and total cost estimate
- Received a 100% response rate
- Feedback was used to better understand ongoing projects and refine MPCA projections of future settlement needs

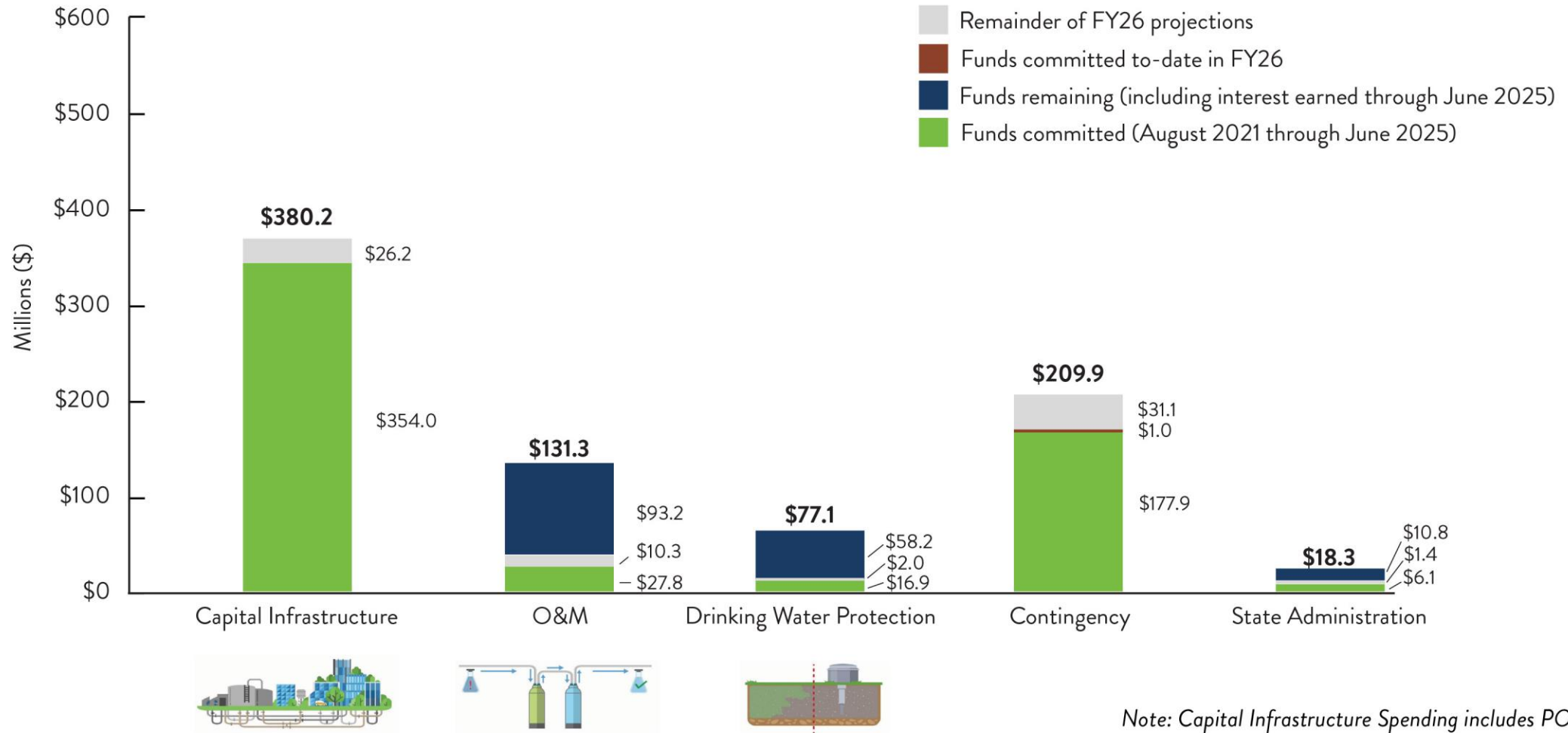

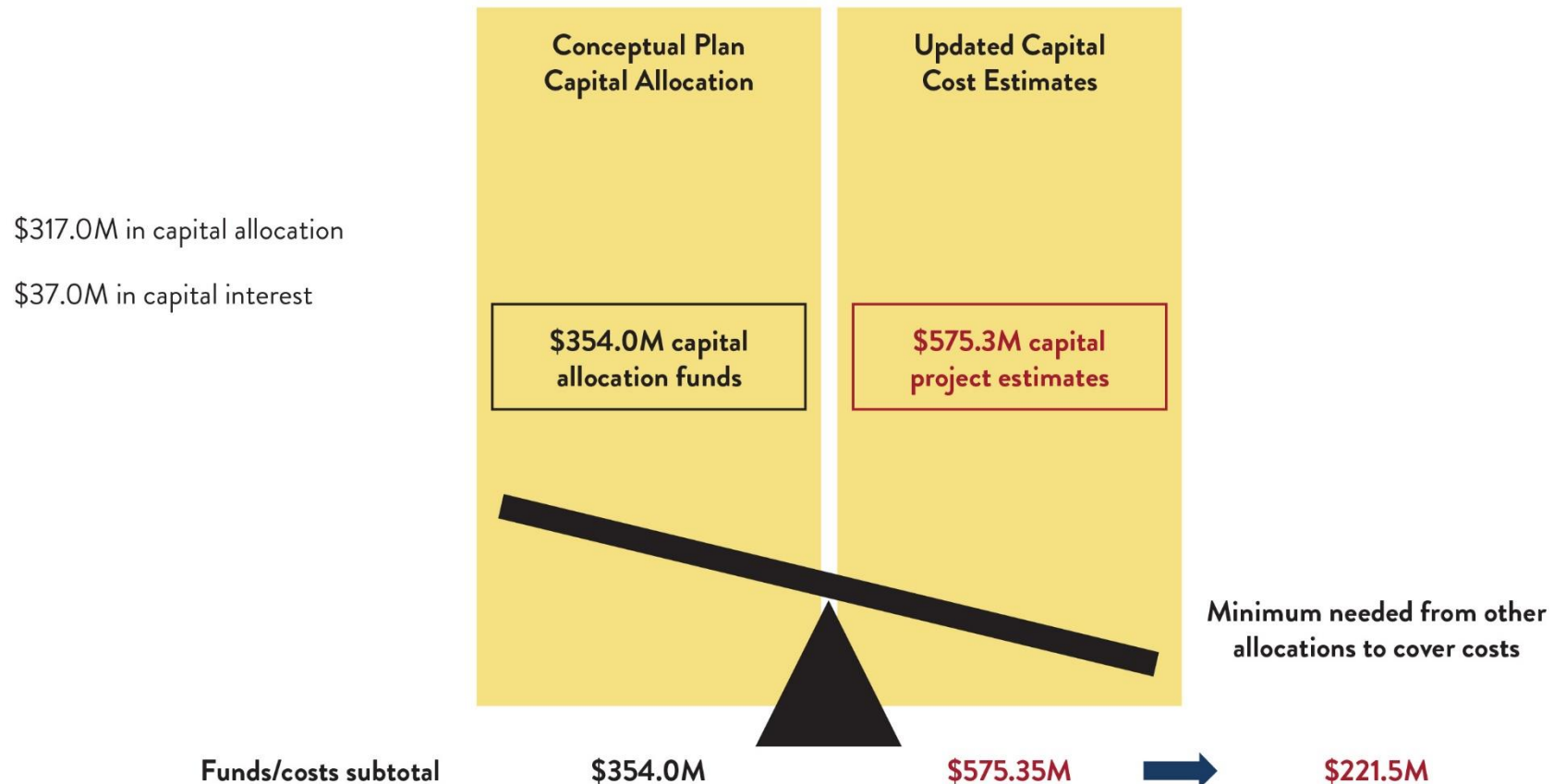

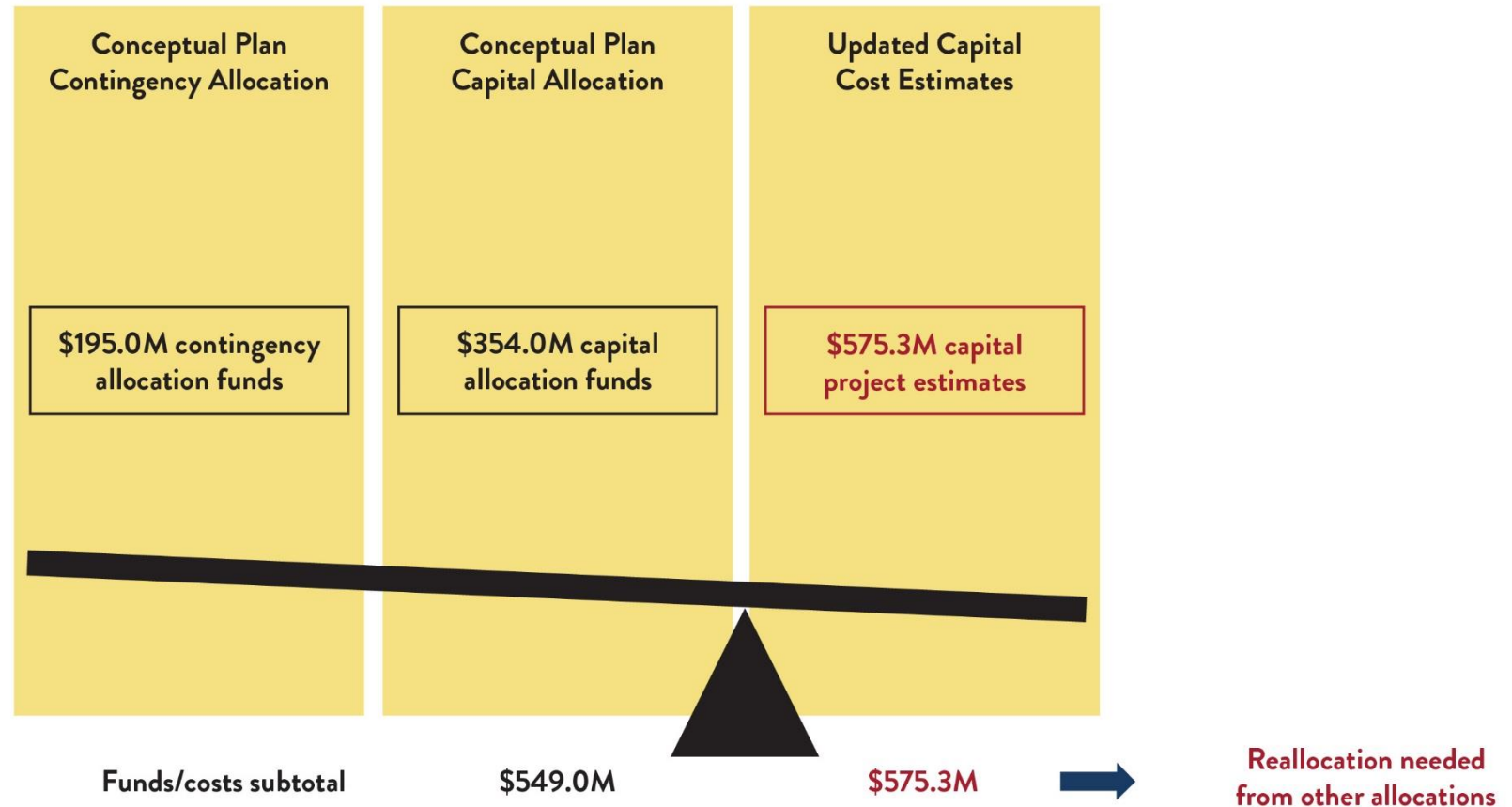
Capital allocation versus cost estimates through fiscal year 2026 (July 2024 – June 2026)

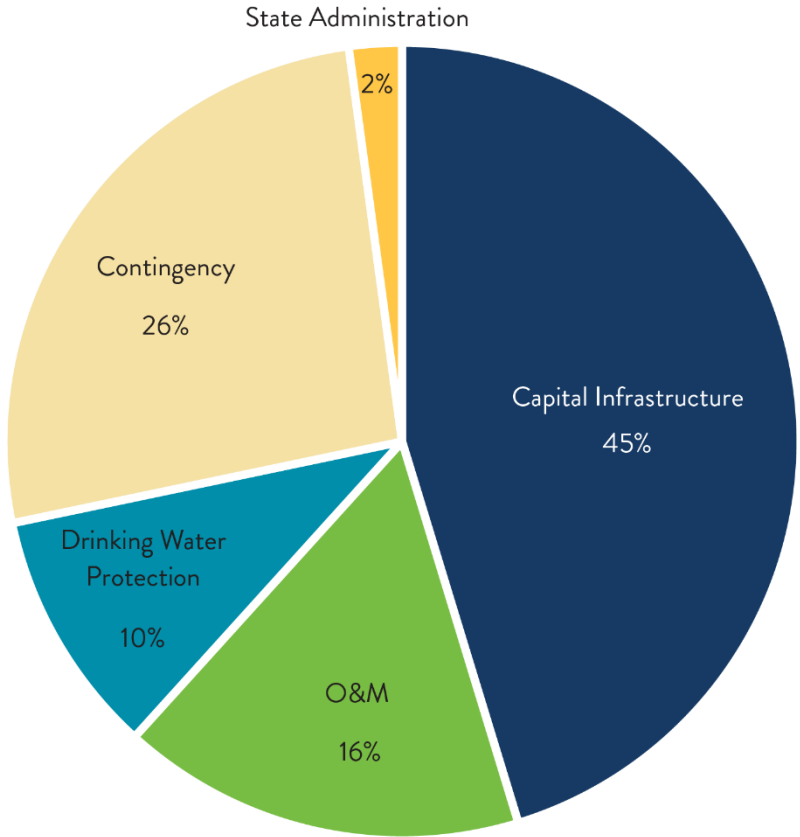
Fund reallocation discussion

- Based on current projections, a reallocation will likely be needed in fiscal year 2026.

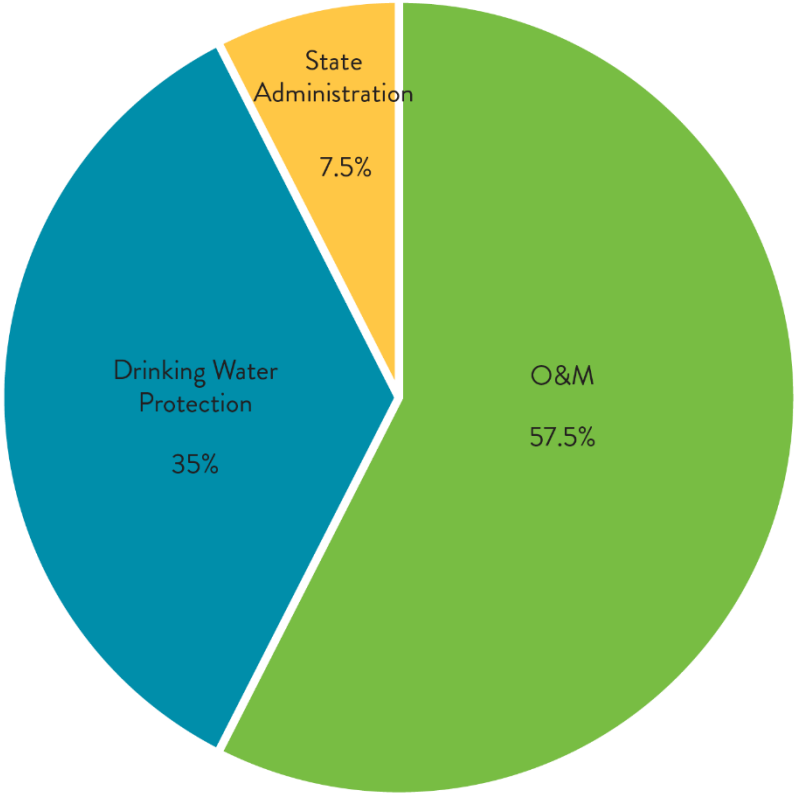
Reallocation approach **for this year**: The Co-Trustees intend to use funds from the Operations and Maintenance (O&M), drinking water protection, and state administration allocations to cover these additional expenses. The reallocations from these accounts will be made in proportion to the original distribution percentages, ensuring that the funding structure remains balanced and consistent with past allocations.

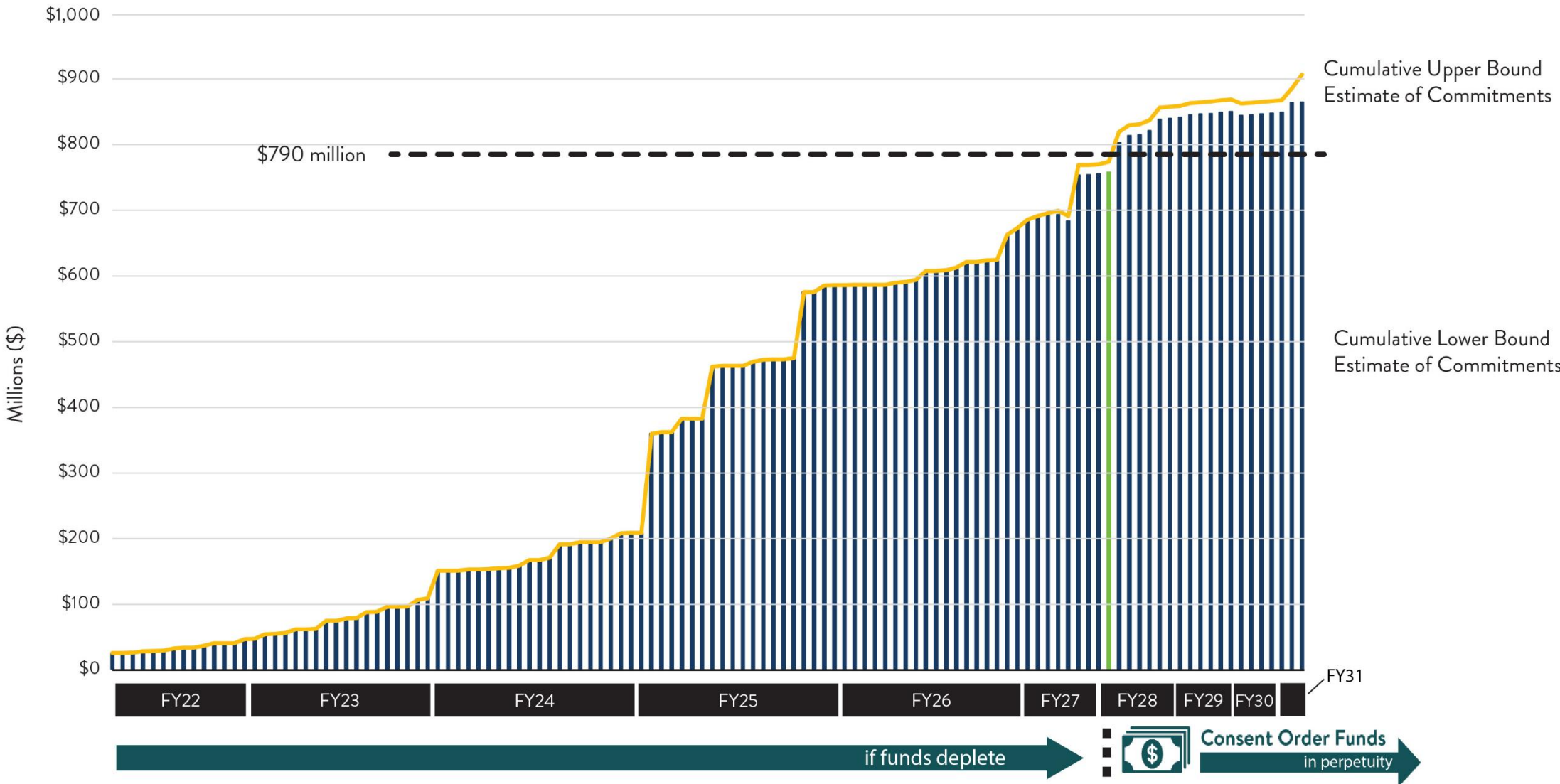

Transitioning to the 2007 Consent Order

Co-trustees' key assumptions include:

- Use community data and best estimates to show a range in the timing of the transition
- The point of transition from the Settlement to the 2007 Consent Order is when funds are committed (i.e., grant awards)
- Future interest is not included in the estimates of timing given uncertainty of interest
- Estimates of future O&M, Drinking Water Protection, and State Administration spending are included

Lower and upper bound of estimated funding needs



- We continue to track the funding as it is committed and communities update estimates
- When allocations run out of funding, drinking water activities would revert to being reimbursed by 3M under the 2007 Settlement Agreement and Consent Order (2007 Consent Order)
- Continued mediation with 3M
